
- More Americans die each year now from drug overdoses than from car crashes and homicides with involving guns combined.
- Most of the overdoses come from opioids, which since ancient days have been relieving pain, providing pleasure and destroying lives.



 Today, opioid addiction has become the new American plague, one seemingly born of greed that affects millions each year and kills hundreds each day.



Eastern Kentucky counties account for the highest opioid prescribing rates in the commonwealth and three counties in our region ranked among the top ten most prescribed counties in the United States.





OPOIOD CRISIS

Floyd County alone, which has an average population of 38,638, McKesson from 2010 to 2016 distributed more than 18.4 million doses of opioids, enough for 477 pills for every adult and child living there.

Opioids were involved in over 42,000 overdose deaths in 2016, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.




Opioid-Involved Overdose Deaths

In 2017, there were 1,160 reported opioid-involved deaths in Kentucky—a rate of 27.9 deaths per 100,000 persons, compared to the average national rate of 14.6 deaths per 100,000 persons. From 1999 through 2015, prescription opioids were the underlying cause of drug overdose deaths.



Opioid Deaths From 1999-2017 in Kentucky






Synthetic Opioids

Synthetic opioids are a class of drugs that are designed to provide pain relief, mimicking naturally occurring opioids such as codeine and morphine.
They tend to be highly potent, which means only a small amount of the drug is required to produce a given effect. They include drugs like tramadol and fentanyl.

Fentanyl

- A synthetic (man-made) opioid 50x more potent than heroin and 100x more potent than morphine.
- Prescribed in the form of transdermal patches, tablets, lozenges, or nasal sprays.
- Can also be illegally made (illicitly manufactured fentanyl) and mixed into other drugs like heroin or cocaine.



OPIOID CRISIS

Many of our Church members suffer from an opioid addiction. Some addictions started innocently enough after an injury or accident when they were prescribed an opioid.
